- 2 owners or managers of businesses other than land development or construction
- 2 from the development community
- 2 from environmental organizations
- 2 from agricultural interests
- 1 non-voting member from Clean Water Services
- 1 non-voting member representing a member city

CWAC terms are for four years and meetings are generally held the second Wednesday of the month at the Clean Water Services Administration Building Complex, 2550 SW Hillsboro Hwy.
